

2017/2018 National Budget Scrutinized

Daystar University had the honor to host the 2017/2018 pre-budget analysis which was broadcast live by K24 Television, from Daystar Nairobi Campus, DAC Auditorium on March 30, 2017. Our very own Deputy Vice-chancellor Finance and Administration Mr. Jomo Gatundu and Dean School of Business and Economics Mr. Evans Amata were part of the panel that discussed the budget. Other panelists were Hon. Henry Obwocha, Chairman of Privatization Commission and Mr. Nahashon Mathenge PKF Taxation Services Limited. The discussion was well moderated by K24 Business News Reporter, Brenda Kerubo and her Producer and Business Reporter, Sarah Adam.

Mr. Gatundu and Mr. Amata who both have a wealth of experience in Financial Management in various sectors where called upon by K24 Television to give insightful and analytical perspective to the 2.6 Trillion Kenya Shillings budget tabled by the Cabinet Secretary for Treasury Mr. Henry Rotich at the Parliament building.

Mr. Gatundu, who has Financial Management industry experience in manufacturing, was pleased by the move to have textile manufacturing companies sell 20 % of their products to the Kenyan market. He lauded the budget saying that it was fairly balanced and favored the common "mwananchi" (man). On the 50% increase in tax on betting, lottery and gaming, he felt the move

was welcome because betting has negatively impacted the social economic wellbeing of the Nation. In the pre-budget analysis Mr. Gatundu submitted that the government should develop strategies to devolve specific economic programmes to the counties so that more youths can be involved.

Mr. Amata on his part was keen on encouraging a well-supported service sector which he believes holds potential for job creation such as in the areas of ICT. He was happy about reviving the non-performing firms and supporting the automobile industry which he felt will positively affect the youth by creating job opportunities. He however, was shy to celebrate the duty free importation of maize which he felt will negatively affect

the farmer because in just four months a lot of maize can be imported into the country.

On the Educational sector, important to note was a proposed allocation of Sh10.1 billion which will go to financing needy students in higher education through the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB).

Students who attended the discussion also gave their views on the budget and posed questions to panelists on matter of employment and monies allocated for job creation.

The historic budget that was read three months in advance due to the upcoming general election is the largest ever spending plan in Kenya's history.

Saham, First Assurance and Chancery Wright were among the partners facilitating the health check-ups.







While this book contains numerous facts and empirical findings and touches on policy issues, its main contribution to the existing literature lies in the theoretical perspective it offers. The core of this book is a general equilibrium theory of labor and marriage presented in Chapter 2, which provides the conceptual framework for the rest of the chapters.

Two major implications of the theory are sex ratio effects and compensating differentials in marriage. The book demonstrates how a few core concepts, linked via economic analysis, help explain a multitude of findings based on statistical analyses of data from a wide variety of cultures. It is hoped that readers of this book will improve their understanding of how marriage works to help us design better economic and social policies as well as help people live better and happier lives, making the book of interest to not only economists but sociologists and anthropologists as well.
