

Daystar Installs Third Chancellor

Prof. Mary Murimi was on June 23, 2016, officially installed as the third Chancellor of Daystar University in a ceremony held in Athi River campus. Prof Murimi comes to Daystar from Texas Tech University College of Human Sciences, USA.

Her appointment follows completion of eleven-year tenure of the former Chancellor, Dr. Florence Muli-Musiime, and her predecessor Dr. James Kamunge.

She holds a Ph.D. in Human Nutrition with an emphasis in community nutrition and behavior change from Iowa State University. She is a registered Dietitian with the American Dietetic Association and a member of the Society of Nutrition Education, and has published over 35 works. Further, she has made international memorandum of understanding between Texas Tech University and Kenyatta University, The Kenya Medical Research

Institute, The Vaal University of Technology in South Africa, Rwanda College of Public Health and The Jigjiga University in Ethiopia.

Prof Murimi is currently a full professor of Nutrition at Texas Tech University in the department of Nutritional Sciences engaged in teaching, grant writing, and research at the local and international level.

Key dignitaries at the installation ceremony included the Chairman of the Commission of University Education, Prof. Henry Thairu, The Archbishop-elect of the Anglican Church of Kenya, Bishop Jackson Nasoore Ole Sapit, former and present Daystar University Company and Council members, representatives from Daystar U.S., Daystar University Parents Association board members, DUAA Board members, representatives of Private and Public Universities including the Founder Chairman of Mt. Kenya University, Dr. Simon Gicharu, Government officials, guests,

family and friends of the incoming Chancellor, faculty, staff and students.

As he recognized the Clergy, Vice-chancellor, Dr. Timothy Wachira narrated that the Daystar's origin and sustenance is anchored within the realms of the Church.

During the installation sermon, Senior Pastor A.I.C. Milimani, Rev. Dr. Matthews K. Mwalwa felt nostalgic about his time in Daystar University as the University Chaplain. "Those 15 years of ministry here at Daystar were very enriching for me. I have wonderful memories of my time with the faculty, staff and students," he said. His message stressed on empowering our society through education. "Daystar University stands at the epitome of empowering students by providing knowledge, Daystar is a gold mine for generations to come," he impressed.

The outgoing Chancellor Dr. Muli-Musiime was full of praise to everyone who supported her in her 11 years of service at the university. "The installation of the 3rd Chancellor of this university is a public demonstration of leadership transition and change management," she highlighted. "We should not take this lightly as we live in a continent where imminent transition opportunities can make or break people and their institutions, and more often than not can stifle the growth of nations or break them with dire consequences for their citizens," she went on. She concluded by pointing out the significance of servant leadership as being both a high calling and an adventure.

Daystar Company Chair, Rev. Dr. Macmillan Kiiru echoed the words of Dr. Muli-Musiime on transition as he acknowledged everyone present who played a role in laying the foundations of building Daystar University. He affirmed that the process and the journey to appoint the Prof. Murimi as third chancellor were credible. "In a time of intense prayer and seeking God, I can confirm without doubt on behalf of the Daystar Company members that Prof. Murimi is God's choice for us in this institution."

Daystar Council Chair, Prof. George Krhoda presided over the citation and this was followed by the long awaited installation of Prof. Mary Murimi as the third Chancellor of Daystar University. Speaking with a distinct sense of belonging, Prof. Murimi offered sincere thanks to the search committee and nominator for showing confidence in her. "Ladies and Gentlemen, after much prayer and consultation, and with a great sense of humility and honor, I am delighted and enthusiastic to accept this appointment as the chancellor of Daystar University," she proclaimed.

"While the rest of the world is just waking up to the importance of women's education and gender equity, Daystar has defined the process," she emphasized, "a majority of our students are female and that proportion is reflected in the teaching staff, administrators and stakeholders," she continued. She promised to start her term by learning the culture of Daystar, listening and observing.

During the discussion session, the different representatives had time to share their thoughts. DVC Academic Affairs Rev. Prof James Kombo pointed out the progress made in infrastructure. He revealed that the University is set to graduate its first batch of eight PhD Clinical Psychology candidates and revealed that the University will be absorbing four of the eight. Class of '96 also suggested that Daystar considers offering online courses. This was well received by the University as Prof Kombo promised the launch of a big online platform starting in the August

2016 semester, to host degree and diploma programs in Education and Communication. This will be followed by other programs later on. He also stated that the university will be starting the Law Program in August semester.

The Class of '96 further requested that the University embraces DUAA as they will be of great help in reaching out to the alumni who have a massive potential of transforming the University. Mr. George Mudhune announced an employment opportunity for a bright fourth year student in the School of Business. The uniqueness and distinguished nature of Daystar graduates, their influence in various fields in the job market and their impact in the society and job industry was also lauded. DUAA Board also shared their plan of launching a business incubation hub and innovation Centre as well as starting honey farming for Community Development students at Athi River campus.

Prof Kombo unveiled an honorary plaque dedicated to the class of '96 at the PAC court. He pointed out that the class of '96 was special given that it was the first group to revisit the University in large numbers. In addition, he gifted each one of them with a study bible, in which he has contributed in its compilation, and urged them to read and practice the word as disciples and servant leaders of Jesus Christ.

The visit culminated with a lunch and cake cutting ceremony as the group celebrated two decades of being alumni of Daystar University. It was truly a happy homecoming and a day to mark the beginning of an annual journey of triumphant servant leadership.

'At the height of one's success, it is very easy to feel like you have done it, forgetting that God enabled you. In all your ways acknowledge God.' True servant leadership is when we do not trust on our own abilities but allow God to lead us.

On his part, the Vice Chancellor's address was brief and staright to the point was: 'Focus your minds beyond the degree. It is a steppingstone to what you desire, yes, we have been called to be servant leaders.'

The Vice Chancellor, DVC Academics and Director ILPD (on behalf of the DVC Finance and Administration), in moment filled with humility, knelt and washed the feet of the graduands, this as a tradition that goes beyond the act of washing feet but signifies servant leadership. Three graduands served as a representatives for the graduating class, From the words of our Chaplain, Rev. Steven Nduto, 'We are sending you to the community to be responsible men and women of God who will take responsibility, walk tall and reflect the character of Christ - this is the order of the towel.'

Picking the expression of Winnie Waiyaki, a PhD graduand, '... being there, was a myriad of mixed emotion. I was elated, humbled,






This book combines depth and relevance with simplicity and pleasant reading, looking forward to involving the reader in a journey of spiritual reflection for the improvement of one's life.


